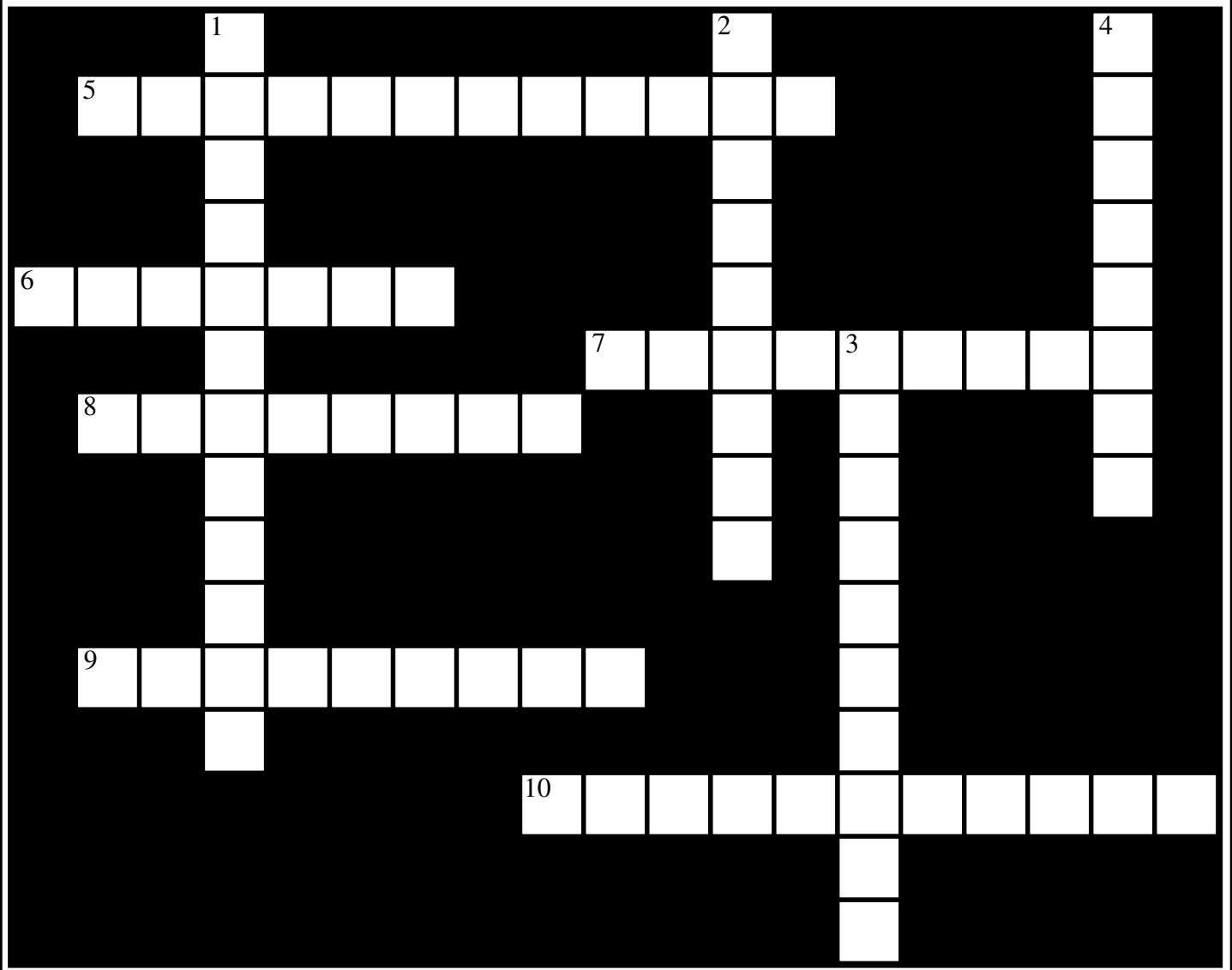

Independence Day Trivia

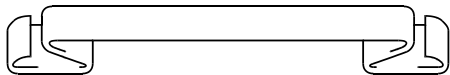
- ☞ The first person to sign the Declaration of Independence was John Hancock, president of the Congress. He became famous for his bold signature, and to this day, to put your “John Hancock” on something means to sign it.
- ☞ When news of the declaration first reached New York, the citizens tore down a life-size statue of King George mounted on his horse. The lead statue was later melted down and used to cast 42,000 bullets for use against British troops.
- ☞ On 4 July 1976, the nation celebrated its 200th Birthday. As part of the Independence Day festivities, 220 sailing ships representing 31 nations were assembled in New York Harbor.

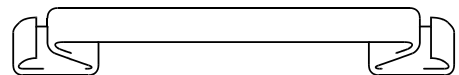
