

American Revolution People

1. _____ took command of the Continental Army in 1775 during the American Revolution.
2. _____ was the first vice-president, and was the second President of the United States.
3. _____'s tombstone reads: "Author of the Declaration of Independence, of the State of Virginia for religious freedom, and Father of the University of Virginia", just as he requested it to.
4. _____ played a large part in the Committees of Correspondence, and labeled the shooting outside the customs house on March 5, 1770 the "Boston Massacre."
5. _____ was an American statesman, printer, scientist, and writer. He was the only American of the colonial period to earn a European reputation as a natural philosopher.
6. _____ was most famous for ending a speech with the resounding words: "...as for me, give me liberty or give me death."
7. _____ was remembered for his last words at the gallows: "I only regret that I have but one life to lose for my country."
8. When the British called for _____ to surrender his ship he replied, "I have not yet begun to fight!"
9. _____ wrote the influential pamphlet *Common Sense* to explain why war with Britain was necessary to the American colonists.
10. _____ was President of the Continental Congress. His name appears first and largest on the Declaration of Independence.
11. _____ was a conservative delegate of the 2nd Continental Congress, and authored the Olive Branch Petition.
12. _____ was known as the female Paul Revere.
13. _____ was the first known American woman to impersonate a man to join the army and take part in combat.
14. _____ advocated for equal treatment for women and spoke out against slavery.
15. _____'s name became synonymous with "traitor".
16. _____ ordered the British troops to take the supplies from Concord.
17. On October 19, 1781 _____ was forced to surrender at Yorktown.
18. _____ was the British Prime Minister during the American Revolution.
19. _____ was the *Father of the American Cavalry*.
20. In 1777, _____ went to America to help fight the British in the Revolution. He helped secure French aid for the American Revolution.
21. _____ helped instill discipline in the Continental army through his drilling techniques during the harsh winter in Valley Forge.
